Patient Centred Care

NEWS2 on Paper

In some ICUs patient NEWS2 scores are being recorded on paper, but then not being uploaded to SystmOne. Where paper is used, the full printed NEWS2 Bundle should be used as ordered and supplied by the printers. Where paper is used the scores should be recorded also in SystmOne.

Please remember that NEWS2 is a track and trigger early warning system to facilitate early detection of patient deterioration and prompt intervention and escalation as per the escalation protocol which is printed onto the

NEWS2 Bundle and in SystmOne. This is to support practice and ensure that the patient is in the right place at the right time with the right people to treat reversible causes of deterioration.

Patient Safety News Flash!

Thank-you to all staff who have completed the Patient Safety Training Modules on ESR! This training is relevant to ALL NHS staff and Level 1 only takes 30 minutes to complete. The team will continue to promote this training and would ask that you promote it within your teams too! The training is key to our implementation of the Patient Safety Strategy and we will ensure that staff across SCFT are informed and involved with developments! 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Ensuring safe use of Smartcards

It is really important to ensure that Smartcards are used safely, and the Digital Team would therefore like to share these key points with all staff:

- When using SystmOne ensure it is always accessed with a Smartcard as it acts as your ID and electronic signature (this is trust policy).
- Smartcards contain details about yourself, including access rights to ensure that staff have access to the right information and the functions you can complete in the system.
- Ensure that you do not share your Smartcard with another member of staff or leave it unattended.

Fluid balance charts

There has been a consistent theme around delayed response to inadequate nutritional and hydration intake for vulnerable inpatients. Often, food and fluid charts are documented but no escalation or action has been taken or evidenced when the patient's intake is consistently insufficient to maintain health or support rehabilitation. The Patient Safety Team would like to support a QI project to address this theme and would welcome interested staff or teams to work with us on this!

Harvey's Lightbulb Moment— The Importance of Education
