ECG machines current and new

This is just a reminder for all staff to please ensure that the current ELI 150s and 280s are kept 'in-date' for scheduled maintenance. All of the Trust's current ELI 150s and 280s will be retrofitted and upgraded to allow the machines to "talk" to SystmOne via Wi-Fi in the next 4 months or so.



End of Life Care Audit

This Audit was carried out 1 year after the Individualised EOL Care Plan was launched and rolled out in Dec 2021 – Feb 2022, to see the potential effect on patients and to see if it is being used as expected for those in the last few days of life. There were 52 patients requested across all PCN's, with 36 from 18 PCN's in West and 16 from 8 PCN's in East, with a total number of 52. The results showed that 12/14 patients in East had a Individualised EOL Care Plan and 13/28 in West. In conclusion the audit showed very good results for staff individualising end of life care and using the document. It was noted that documentation was on the whole good with some evidence of outstanding high quality assessments being undertaken. The audit highlighted some process issues which will formulate part of an action plan for the coming year. There were some S1 issues highlighted which have now been rectified.
